National Quilt Expert Reveals Secrets of Illinois Amish Quilts

ATHENS, Tenn. (July 23, 2010)—The hidden world of Illinois Amish quilts will be brought to light by renowned quilt expert and author Janice Tauer Wass during a presentation and workshop scheduled to coincide with the McMinn County Living Heritage Museum's national quilt show this fall.

Both programs will focus on expanding attendees' technical vocabulary and appreciation of design elements such as value, rhythm, simplification, visual tension, and balance.

Participants will learn how to expand their own quilting repertoire by applying the lessons of color and composition taught by Wass.

Wass is the retired Curator of Decorative Arts at the Illinois State Museum, where she oversaw a collection of more than 160 Amish quilts. She is also the author of *Amish Quilts:*Sharing Threads of Tradition. Currently a resident of Vonore, Tenn., she has taught many classes and juried numerous quilt shows, including at the prestigious International Quilt Festival in Houston.

Wass's lecture will be Friday, October 22, at 6 p.m., and will cost \$5 for Museum members and \$10 for nonmembers. The workshop will be Saturday, October 23, from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., with a cost of \$70 for members and \$75 for nonmembers. A supply kit will be provided for workshop participants.
