Children unearth history at Living Heritage Museum Archeology Camp

ATHENS, Tenn. (June 18, 2010)—Rising fourth and fifth graders sifted through layers of dirt and history—on Thursday, June 17, at the McMinn County Living Heritage Museum's Archeology Camp.

Under the supervision of Lisa Chastain, curator of exhibits, children used trowels, brushes, and screens to uncover and examine "artifacts," including pottery shards and arrow heads, in a specially prepared dig pit outside the Museum. Then, camp participants made their own clay pots and arrow-head jewelry.

"The children were able to connect with Native American history in a personal, hands-on way," said Chastain. "They really enjoyed imagining what life would have been like for this region's first inhabitants. And they all asked if they could visit the Museum again this summer!"
